## Born to Die

The Great Descent – Philippians 2:5-11 December 4, 2016

Therefore, God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name... **-Philippians 2:9** 

#### I. NO ROBBERY HERE

- Jesus shares the form (essence) of God, but in the humility of the Incarnation, he willingly set aside his rights as God (Matt. 20:28; Luke 22:27; John 3:16).
- He who had the "form" of God, took on the "form" of a servant and a human "form" when he became man (vss. 6-8; Matt. 21:5).
- In the Incarnation, Jesus did not give up his divinity, he added our humanity. He is "fully God and fully man" (Matt. 1:23; 9:6; 12:8; John 13:1-17).
- Jesus' Incarnation led to his "death on a cross" (vs. 8; Matt. 1:20 -21; Mark 10:32-34).

#### II. THE NAME ABOVE EVERY NAME

- Not "a name" but "the name" that is above all names. It is in the name that belongs to Jesus that every knee will bow; the name Kyrios—LORD (Matt. 17:4; 20:30; 21:9).
- Not all will bow out of desire, but all will bow out of necessity. Some with spontaneous ecstasy, others with grudging mourning and shame (2 Chron. 6:24-31; Ps. 79:6; 91:14; Hosea 5:4, 15; 13:4; Luke 7:29; 12:8; Rom. 14:10-12).
- The Incarnation, the humility of Christ, his death upon the cross, our acknowledging him as Lord—all of these realities lead to the glory of God (vs. 11; Isa. 43:7; 2 Pet. 1:17).

**KNOW**: Jesus took on flesh so that he might make a way for us to come to the Father. By his coming down, he has been raised up, and one day every knee will bow to him.

**DO**: Acknowledge the great name of Jesus.
